




Almelo (Netherlands), Silkeborg (Denmark) and Munsterland Sud (Germany)

It became all the rage especially after it was possible to print multiple copies of "carte de visite" and there were many familiar names, but maybe not faces, to see including Charles Dickens, Charles Darwin, Ford Maddox Brown and many other celebrities of the time including one of Queen Victoria with a son, a grandson and a great-grandson all of whom would later be king in their turn as Edward VII, George V and Edward VIII.

Back on the coach and it was off to Guildford Cathedral. The purpose of the visit was to see the Soroptimist stained glass window. Unfortunately the Cathedral is undergoing a major repair and cleaning operation and there was scaffolding up inside so the window was obscured somewhat. However, with a bit of bending and stretching it could be seen quite well.
